Illinois National Guard (ING) Grant

- The ING Grant is an entitlement program
 - Eligible applicants are exempt from paying eligible tuition and certain fees
 - Awarded to all eligible applicants regardless of funding levels
 - Specified by Illinois statute
 - Chapter 110, Higher Education Student Assistance Act
 - https://ilga.gov/legislation/ilcs/ilcs3.asp?ActID=1161&ChapterID=18
 - Benefits are available at all Illinois 2- and 4-year public colleges
 - May be used at the undergraduate and graduate levels
 - Eligible applicants may receive:
 - Equivalent of four academic years of full-time enrollment (120 units)
 - Equivalent of six academic years of full-time enrollment (180 units) if completed 10 years or more of active duty ING service
 - No minimum enrollment requirement
 - Non-credit courses are eligible



ING Eligible Fees

- Pays tuition and certain fees
 - Fees eligible students are exempt from paying:
 - Registration fees
 - Graduation fees
 - General Activity fees
 - Term fees
 - Matriculation fees
 - Typically charged only to new students when they have been both admitted and enrolled
 - Fees that are not exempt:
 - Book rental fees
 - Laboratory and Supply fees
 - Air Flight fees
 - Hospital and Health Insurance fees
 - Room and Board fees
 - Parking fees
 - Student Union fees
 - Athletic fees
 - Proficiency or Placement Exam fees and other similar fees
 - Service fees



ING Grant Eligibility Criteria

- To be eligible for the ING Grant program, a student must:
 - Be an Illinois National Guard member, meeting one of these two criterion:
 - be active in the Illinois National Guard or
 - have been active in the Illinois National Guard for at least five consecutive years and have been called to federal active duty for at least six months and be within 12 months after their discharge date from the Illinois National Guard
 - Have completed one full year of service in the Illinois National Guard
 - Be an enlisted member or an officer (Public Act 94-583)
 - Be enrolled at an Illinois public 2- or 4-year college
 - Maintain an acceptable grade point average (GPA) according to the policy determined by your college
 - Not be in default on any student loan, nor owe a refund on any state or federal grant



ING Grant Eligibility Criteria

- ISAC General Provisions 2700.40 General Applicant Eligibility Requirements
 - i) Except for grants pursuant to 23 III. Adm. Code 2730 (Illinois National Guard Grant Program) (ING Grant) and 23 III. Adm. Code 2733 (Illinois Veteran Grant Program) (IVG Grant), an applicant must be maintaining satisfactory academic progress in accordance with the institution's policy.
- Illinois National Guard Grant Rules Section 2730.20 Applicant Eligibility
 - d) Recipients must maintain an acceptable grade point average as determined by the institution pursuant to a published policy.



ING Grant Eligibility Units

- Students receive 120 units of eligibility
 - Equivalent to four academic years of full-time enrollment
 - Units are based on the enrolled hours for a term
- Members of the Illinois National Guard who have served at least 10 years in the Guard may be eligible to receive up to 180 units (6 years) of eligibility for the ING Grant

ING Grant Eligibility Units

- Full program benefits may be extended for one additional term if the recipient
 has accumulated fewer than the maximum number of eligibility units but does
 not have enough units remaining for the number of hours in which they are
 enrolled for that term
- If the recipient withdraws from enrollment after the tuition refund/withdrawal adjustment period, the recipient will receive a grant for costs incurred up to the term award provided the institution's tuition refund policy indicates the recipient has incurred charges in the amount of the claim
- If a recipient ceases to be an active member of the Guard during a term, benefits stop, and the student is responsible for costs attributed to the remainder of the term
- If a recipient meets the one year IL National Guard requirement to become eligible during a term, benefits should be prorated for the portion of the term for which the student meets the eligibility requirement
 - Proration calculation: total tuition cost divided by total instructional days = cost per day x days of eligibility = total proration



ING Residency Policies

- Out-of-state residents who meet the eligibility requirements receive tuition and fee benefits equivalent to those received by in-state residents at the Illinois institution.
- Recipients attending out-of-district community colleges will receive tuition and applicable fee benefits equivalent to those at the in-district rate.
- Recipients shall not be responsible for paying the difference between instate and out-of-state tuition nor will they be responsible for paying the difference between in-district and out-of-district tuition.
- Institutions are permitted to require documentation of residency in order to determine in-district or out-of-district payment.



ING Grant Application Process

- Students must re-apply each year
 - There are no longer application deadline dates for each term
 - However, applications must be submitted in time for ISAC to determine eligibility and for the applicant to be able to notify the college no later than the last scheduled day of classes for the term for which the student would like to use benefits
 - ➤ This went into effect beginning with the 2023-24 academic year,
- The ING Grant interactive application can be accessed via from the ISAC Student Portal
 - Applicants must have a profile in the Student Portal to complete and submit the application
 - Once a profile is created, applicants can return to the Student Portal to check their application status, verify the number of ING Grant eligibility units remaining, or print copy of ING Grant eligibility notification
 - Students will receive a confirmation page upon completing the application
 - Students should allow at least 4 weeks for processing of the application
- Qualified applicants will receive a notice of eligibility from ISAC and colleges can see eligibility information in the ING Grant system in GAP Access



ING Grant Administration Process

• ISAC

- Determines compliance with application requirements
- Monitors benefit usage (units) to ensure that applicants have not exceeded the maximum benefits
- Illinois Department of Military Affairs (DMAIL)
 - Certifies (in GAP Access) that the applicant is on active status with the Illinois National Guard
 - If applicable, provides date for when one-year service requirement will be met or when active status will end
 - Confirms 10 years or more of service, which allows recipient to receive two additional years of benefits

ISAC sends:

- Notice of Eligibility to qualified applicants
- Notice of Ineligibility to individuals who do not meet eligibility criteria




ING Grant Administration Process

- Colleges report enrollment hours and benefit dollar amounts for initial, indistrict and out-of-district requests and to make adjustments in the ING Grant system in GAP Access
- ING Grant benefit usage data can be submitted by either File Transfer Protocol (FTP) or the GAP Access portal
- New data for students eligible for benefits will be available whenever there
 is a new or updated eligible record for the college
- New data could potentially be available on a daily basis, the college may not have students that appear in the system each day
- Although ISAC will not be able to reimburse colleges for the ING Grant, reporting of enrollment hours must still take place so that benefit usage (eligibility units) can be accurately assessed to student's accounts



ING Grant Benefit Usage Reporting

- To report benefit usage, colleges must provide the number credit hours enrolled and the tuition and fee amounts
- When combining benefits with the Post-9/11 GI Benefit, the eligibility percentage (as determined by the VA) should also be provided
 - The system will multiply the number of credit hours the student is enrolled in by the percentage being covered by the ING Grant to prorate units





ING Grant Reminders

- It is recommended that colleges check the ING Grant system at least once a week for new student applicant data that may have been added to your school's list
- Schools may rely on the eligibility information provided by ISAC in GAP Access
 - Colleges do not have to require that the student provide a copy of their eligibility letter
- Submit benefit usage by term priority dates so they are considered timely and eligible to be reimbursed ICCB or ISAC funding



2024-25 ING Grant Program News

- ING Grant benefit usage data for the fall term must be submitted on or before Tuesday, December 31, 2024 to be considered timely
- Even though ISAC may not be able to fully reimburse institutions for ING Grant awards, reporting of benefits used must still take place so that usage can be accurately reflected on student accounts
- Colleges are encouraged to check their Benefits Results report after submitting benefit usage to ensure all processed as expected
- The 160-byte file specifications, describing the file layout that can be used to send data to ISAC via the File Transfer Protocol (FTP) process, can be found in the Electronic Tools section of the e-Library



Illinois Veteran Grant (IVG)

- IVG is an entitlement program
 - o Eligible applicants are exempt from paying eligible tuition & mandatory fees
 - "Mandatory fees" is defined as: The charges assessed by an institution that are required to deliver educational services to students for each term, regardless if a student is attending on- campus or through distance education. Application, graduation, laboratory, breakage, add/drop fees, and program administrative fees for out-of-state or foreign study are specifically excluded. For the purposes of ISAC's rules, tuition is not a mandatory fee.
 - o Benefits are available at all Illinois 2- and 4-year public colleges
 - May be used at the undergraduate and graduate levels
 - Eligible applicants may receive the equivalent of four academic years of fulltime enrollment (120 units)
 - No minimum enrollment requirement
 - Non-credit courses may be eligible



IVG Eligibility Units

- Students receive 120 units of eligibility.
 - Equivalent to four academic years of full-time enrollment.
 - o Units are based on the enrolled hours for a term.
 - Full program benefits may be extended for one additional term if the recipient has accumulated fewer than 120 eligibility units but does not have enough units remaining for the number of hours in which the recipient is enrolled for the term.

- To be eligible, a student must:
 - Satisfy Illinois residency requirements by meeting the below qualifications as outlined either in #1, #2 and #3, or in #4:
 - 1. Currently reside in Illinois unless the student is serving federal active-duty service at the time of enrollment in college or residing with a spouse in continued military service who is currently stationed outside of Illinois.
 - 2. Were a resident of Illinois at the time of entering federal active-duty service or within six months prior to entering the service or were a student at an Illinois public 2- or 4-year college at the time of entering federal active-duty service.
 - 3. Established, or if on federal active-duty service, plan to establish Illinois residency within six months after leaving federal active-duty service, or if married to a person in continued military service:

OR

4. Reside in Illinois at the time of application and at the time of receiving benefits for enrollment and, at some point after leaving federal active-duty service, have been a resident of Illinois for at least 15 consecutive years.



- To be eligible, a student must:
 - Meet one of the following two criteria:
 - have served at least one year of federal active-duty service in the Armed Forces of the United States, which may include the Illinois National Guard and the Reserve component of the Armed Forces, or
 - regardless of length of service:
 - have served in a foreign country in a time of hostilities in that country (as recognized by the issuance of a Presidential proclamation or a Presidential executive order and in which the Armed Forces expeditionary medal or other campaign service medals are awarded according to Presidential executive order);
 - was medically discharged for service-related reasons; or
 - was discharged prior to August 11, 1967.



- To be eligible, a student must:
 - Have received an honorable discharge for the most recent period of federal active- duty service, and/or be honorably serving
 - Effective July 1, 2022, an honorable discharge may include a discharge under other than honorable conditions or a general discharge under honorable conditions if only due to a person's sexual orientation or gender identity but does not include a bad conduct discharge or a dishonorable discharge
 - Not be a current member of the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC)
 - Applicants are not eligible if their only service has been attendance at a service academy
 - Time served attending military schools or for Initial Active Duty for Training, in the Delayed Entry Program, National Guard, Reserve or any other time that was not federal active duty is not considered equal to federal active-duty service
 - Drill time (weekend and summer drills) by Guard members and Reservists is not equivalent to federal active-duty service



- To be eligible to receive benefits, an eligible student must:
 - Be enrolled at an Illinois public 2- or 4-year college.
 - Maintain an acceptable grade point average (GPA) according to the policy determined by your college.
 - Not be in default on any student loan, nor owe a refund on any state or federal grant.



- From ISAC General Provisions 2700.40 General Applicant Eligibility Requirements
 - i) Except for grants pursuant to 23 Ill. Adm. Code 2730 (Illinois National Guard Grant Program) (ING Grant) and 23 Ill. Adm. Code 2733 (Illinois Veteran Grant Program) (IVG Grant), an applicant must be maintaining satisfactory academic progress in accordance with the institution's policy
- From IVG Rules Section 2733.20 Applicant Eligibility
 - e) A recipient must maintain an acceptable grade point average as determined by the institution pursuant to a published policy



IVG Residency Policies

- Legislation went into effect in July 2019 that amended the Illinois residency requirements for IVG, allowing for veterans who have resided in Illinois for at least 15 years to qualify, based on these requirements -
 - o The veteran must:
 - reside in Illinois at the time of application
 - have been a resident of Illinois for at least 15 consecutive years after leaving federal active
 - reside in Illinois at the time of receiving benefits for enrollment
- Documentation to confirm 15 consecutive years of residency will be needed to establish eligibility



IVG Application Process

- Student only needs to complete the IVG application once; it does not have to submitted every award year
 - Students should allow at least 4 6 weeks for processing
 - If there's a need to make changes/updates after submission, students should contact ISAC
- The online application can be accessed from the ISAC Student Portal
 - Applicants who are unable to access the online application, may download and print a PDF version and submit the completed application to ISAC
- ISAC will send an acknowledgement e-mail when the application is received
- Eligible applicants will receive a Notice of Eligibility letter from ISAC
 - If an application is incomplete or missing information, the applicant will receive a Notice of Incomplete Application letter
 - Missing information/documents must be submitted to ISAC within 60 days of the letter or the application will be canceled and the student will need to reapply
- Qualified applicants must notify their college's financial aid office of their eligibility status no later than the last scheduled day of classes for the term for which a grant is requested



IVG Residency Policies

- Regardless of how a student has qualified for the Illinois residency component of the program's eligibility criteria, the student veteran must reside in Illinois while enrolled to use IVG benefits
 - An IVG independent student does not have to be verified to have resided in Illinois for 12 continuous months prior to the start of the award year... the student just has to be currently residing in Illinois while enrolled to use IVG benefits
- Students who may have left Illinois after establishing their eligibility for the program may maintain their IVG eligibility, but must return to Illinois to continue to use benefits
- Students who are not residing in Illinois while enrolled cannot use IVG benefits unless:
 - federal active duty is being served during the time of enrollment, or
 - the qualified applicant is residing with a spouse in continued military service who
 is currently stationed outside of Illinois




IVG Residency Policies

- For schools that have a process requiring student veterans to provide information on which veteran benefits they want to use, they may collect confirmation that the student is residing in Illinois as part of that process
- Best practice would be to have a certification statement as part of the form that the student is signing each term, allowing the student to confirm benefit choices and provide Illinois residency information
 - This would be sufficient documentation to confirm that the student meets the IVG requirement to reside in Illinois while using benefits
- Other documentation to confirm residency may include:
 - FAFSA/ISIR data indicating an Illinois address
 - Documentation used to confirm residency for other ISAC programs with dates applicable to the term/award year
- If an institution has information on file for a student (student billing address, transcript request, etc.) indicating an out-of-state address, the institution is expected to verify residency by collecting documentation to confirm that the student is currently residing in Illinois while enrolled in order to provide IVG benefits



IVG Benefit Usage Reporting


- IVG benefit usage reporting process is done in the IVG system in GAP Access
- Colleges must report enrollment hours and tuition and fee benefit amounts for initial, supplemental (adjustments), in-district and out-of-district claims
- If combining benefits with the Post-9/11 GI Benefit, the eligibility percentage (as determined by the VA) should also be provided
 - The system will multiply the number of credit hours the student is enrolled in by the percentage being covered by IVG to prorate units





Student Benefit List: View screen


- Because the IVG application does not collect information about the student's school choice, ISAC does not generate an IVG student eligibility list that is specific to each school.
- The initial student list that colleges will see when logging in to the IVG system will be a list of all students who have received an IVG benefit at their institution in the last three academic years.
- Colleges will then have the ability through the Add Student screen to search ISAC's database for new, additional students who may want to use their IVG benefits at their school.
 - Once a student has been added to the school's list, FAAs will be able to see an eligibility detail screen for the student and create a benefit request.
- The academic terms are numbered in the IVG system as:
 - 3 = Summer term
 - 1 = Fall term
 - 2 = Spring term





Benefit Add IVG Student screen

- In order to add a student to your school list, at least two of the three student identifiers must be entered
- If the search does not provide a result, that means either the student is not eligible or is not in ISAC's database
 - For example, a school would not be able to add a student whose IVG application is in process and has not yet been determined to be eligible or an applicant whose status may have changed from eligible to ineligible

2024-25 IVG Grant Program News

- No changes to the program or application process
- Benefit request processing for summer and fall terms is now available
 - o IVG award year starts with the summer term
- In order for IVG benefit usage data to be considered timely:
 - o For the summer term, it must have been submitted by September 30, 2024
 - For the fall term, it must be submitted by December 31, 2024
- Even though ISAC may not be able to fully reimburse institutions IVG awards reporting of benefits used must still take place so that usage can be accurately reflected on students' accounts
- Colleges are encouraged to regularly check their Benefits Results report
- The 160-byte file specifications, describing the file layout for sending data to ISAC via the File Transfer Protocol (FTP) process, can be found in the Electronic Tools section of the e-Library



Fiscal Year 2025 News for ING Grant and IVG

- The FY25 state budget includes funding for ISAC to reimburse public universities for some of the tuition fees waived for ING Grant & IVG recipients
 - Unlike in years past, when IVG and ING each had a separate line item and ISAC used the funds to pay both public university and community college claims, this appropriation is for \$6 million and is written as applying to both IVG and ING, but only at the state's public universities.
- As has been the case for several years, a separate FY25 appropriation of \$4,264,200 is being provided to the Illinois Community College Board (ICCB) to reimburse community colleges for ING Grant and IVG benefits provided
- More information about when and how the ISAC funding will be disbursed to universities will be provided soon
 - Similar to the process for ICCB, reimbursements will first be made for timely claims, so it's important to meet the term priority dates



ING & IVG: Non-Credit or Non-Degree Courses

- Students may use IVG and ING benefits:
 - o for non-credit or non-degree courses
 - o for courses offered through contractual or consortium agreements
 - at the public university or community college as the institution of record
- Attempted/completed courses must appear on a student's record and/or transcript at the ISAC-approved institution.
 - From a tracking and auditing standpoint, there would need to be a record of the type of program or coursework for which a student has received IVG or ING benefits.
- IVG/ING eligible tuition and fee charges would need to be reflected on the student's account, indicating the amount of the charges that IVG/ING benefits are covering.
- IVG/ING benefits can be used for programs that involve a contractual agreement with a provider outside of the institution (i.e. truck driving schools)
 - the key is that the student has to be enrolled at the public community college, not directly enrolled in the third-party provider.
 - the tuition and fee data reported in the school's IVG budget would have to be high enough to cover eligible tuition and fee charges.



Non-Credit or Non-Degree Courses

A few relevant excerpts from ISAC rules for reference which are important factors that apply to being eligible to use IVG and ING program benefits.

From ISAC's General Provisions, Section 2700.20 Definitions --

"Contractual Agreement" – The written agreement between an eligible institution and a school or organization that is not eligible for participation in ISAC-administered programs whereby the non-eligible institution provides part of the education program of students enrolled at the eligible institution, as codified in Section 2700.80. A contractual agreement differs from a consortium agreement, which is an agreement among 2 or more eligible institutions only.

"Enrolled" – The status of a student who has completed the institution's registration requirements and is attending classes.

"Distance Education" – A learning and teaching mode characterized by the separation of place or time between instructor and student, which includes programs and courses offered by correspondence and telecommunications.

"Institution of Record" – The postsecondary institution at which a student is enrolled and seeking a degree or certificate. This institution assumes primary responsibility for certification of eligibility for ISAC-administered programs and for requesting payment from ISAC.

From **IVG Rules** -- Section 2733.30 Program Procedures

c) Benefits are applicable to both undergraduate and graduate enrollment. There are no minimum credit hour enrollment requirements and benefits are applicable for noncredit courses.

From ING Rules -- Section 2730.30 Program Procedures

c) Benefits are applicable to both undergraduate and graduate enrollment. There is no minimum credit-hour enrollment requirement. Benefits are applicable for noncredit courses.



Non-Credit or Non-Degree Courses

- When submitting a benefit request in the IVG/ING System schools need to report the number of credit hours for both credit courses and non-credit courses.
- ISAC does not provide instructions on converting continuing education hours to credit hours however the FSA Handbook has some guidance.
- Schools should have procedures in place to consistently convert the continuing education hours to credit hours.



Guidance on Combining ING Grant & IVG Benefits With Other Programs



ING Grant, IVG, and the Monetary Award Program (MAP)

- If a student who is eligible for the Monetary Award Program (MAP) is also eligible for ING Grant and/or IVG benefits, all ING Grant and IVG benefits that are available for the term(s) must be used first
 - A student cannot decline ING Grant or IVG benefits in favor of using MAP benefits
 - After all applicable ING Grant benefits have been used for a term, then a partial MAP award may be applied to any outstanding eligible tuition and fees
 - IVG and MAP are not able to be combined
 - Once a student is determined eligible for IVG, it must be used instead of MAP



Using the ING Grant or IVG with Other Tuition and Fee Benefits

- ING members who have been called to federal active duty may be eligible for the IVG program
- Applicants who meet all eligibility requirements for both the IVG and ING Grant programs may have the option of receiving benefits from both programs during the same term(s) and/or academic year
 - A recipient's assessment of eligibility unit usage is based on enrolled hours per term, not the dollar amount paid by the benefits
 - This means that the number of eligibility units charged will be the same for each program, even though the dollar amount of benefits received from each program may be different
 - ➤ For example, if benefits from the IVG and ING Grant programs are used for full-time enrollment, 12 eligibility units will be charged to each program.
- Applicants should consult with the college's financial aid office prior to receiving benefits for both programs



Combining Post-9/11 GI Bill Program with State Benefits

- Students can decline IVG, ING and/or MAP to use federal benefits that also provide tuition and fee benefits
 - Federal benefits will be applied first and any remaining eligible charges for tuition and fees may be covered by ING Grant or IVG benefits
- If a student chooses to use their federal benefits with ING or IVG benefits, eligibility units assessed will be prorated based on the percentage of charges paid by ING or IVG
 - The percentage of charges covered by ING or IVG benefits will be multiplied by the number of credit hours in which the student is enrolled for the term, and that converted number of credit hours will determine the number of eligibility units to be assessed



Combining Post-9/11 GI Bill Program with State Benefits

- For veterans who are eligible for Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits and who choose
 to use those benefits with the IVG or ING Grant programs in the same term,
 the Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits may be applied first (VA will be first payer),
 and any remaining eligible tuition and fee charges would be covered by the
 IVG and/or ING Grant.
- IVG and ING rules allow the VA to be first payer for any level of Chapter 33 eligibility, **including the 100% level**.
 - For example, students at the 100% level who don't have enough VA benefits for a full term could use up remaining Chapter 33 benefits first and then use IVG or ING to cover remaining charges.
- When combining IVG and/or ING benefits with the Post-9/11 GI Bill:
 - The number of IVG and ING Grant units used will be prorated for students at the 50-90% eligibility levels.
 - IVG and ING units are not to be prorated for students at the 100% eligibility level.


