- This program was designed to recruit and retain individuals to work in technology jobs that have a high demand for new employees
- Provides scholarship assistance to undergraduate students enrolled in qualified programs of study that will prepare them to pursue careers in Information Technology (IT) and related careers
- Scholarship funds that may be used for tuition and fees and room and board costs at qualified institutions
 - ISAC will annually determine a maximum award amount based on appropriated funds
- Priority will be given to students who demonstrate academic excellence, students who demonstrate financial need, and minority students
- Recipients agree to work in Illinois in a qualifying job for a period of no less than one year
 - Must begin employment within one year following completion of their program
 - o If the commitment is not fulfilled, the scholarship converts to a loan



Definitions

- Qualifying degree -- an associate or a bachelor's degree granted by a qualified institution in the field of computer information sciences; information technology; information science; computer science; computer systems networking and telecommunications; computer and information systems security or information assurance, including cybersecurity; or management information systems.
- Qualified institution -- an educational organization located in Illinois that meets the requirements outlined in the Higher Education Student Assistance and in the General Provisions part of ISAC's Administrative Rules under the definition of Institution of Higher Learning
- Qualifying job -- a job with an employer in the State of Illinois performing work that is directly related to the field of study that qualified the candidate for assistance.
- Minority student -- has the same meaning as the term is defined under in the Higher Education Student Assistance Act and in the General Provisions part of ISAC's Administrative Rules



- To be eligible, an applicant must:
 - Be a U.S. citizen or an eligible non-citizen or meet the "undocumented student" criteria of the RISE Act
 - Be an Illinois resident
 - Have graduated from high school or have received a State of Illinois High School Diploma and have maintained a cumulative grade point average of no less than 2.5 on a 4.0 scale
 - Pursue or intend to pursue a qualifying degree;
 - computer information sciences
 - information technology
 - information science
 - computer science
 - computer systems networking and telecommunications
 - computer and information systems security or information assurance, including cybersecurity; or management information systems
 - Be enrolled at an ISAC-approved institution of higher learning, on at least a halftime basis, in a course of study necessary to obtain a qualifying degree;
 - Maintain satisfactory academic progress, as determined by the institution



Application process

- To be considered for the scholarship, an applicant must submit a complete Application/Work Agreement/Promissory Note and FAFSA or Alternative Application for the same year
 - Requires that a valid Student Aid Index (SAI) be calculated
 - When a submitted application is incomplete, ISAC will notify the applicant, who will have an opportunity to furnish any missing information
 - The application will only be considered for processing as of the date the application is complete and received at ISAC's Deerfield office.

Certification process

 Colleges will be asked to complete a certification process in GAP Access to confirm that applicants at their institution are enrolled in a qualified program and are meeting the eligibility criteria that must be confirmed by the school

Award determination

- The program is designed to give priority to renewal applicants who continue to meet the eligibility requirements, then those applicants who demonstrate academic excellence, demonstrate financial need, and are minority applicants
- Once renewal applicants have been awarded, the awarding methodology will consider academic excellence, financial need and minority status as evenly-weighted separate values that will be summed to determine an overall priority score



- The total amount of funds awarded to a qualified recipient in a given academic year, when added to other financial aid available to student cannot exceed the cost of attendance.
 - If the amount of financial aid to be awarded exceeds the institution's cost of attendance, the iGROW Tech Scholarship shall be reduced
- If the recipient receives other assistance targeted specifically for tuition, fees, and room and board expenses, the combined assistance shall not exceed the total tuition, fees, and room and board expenses incurred by the student, and if it does, the institution shall reduce one of the awards accordingly
- If the recipient is eligible for assistance under the Monetary Award Program (MAP), the recipient may not be eligible for a full iGROW award because MAP must be factored into the financial aid package prior to receiving iGROW assistance
 - The institution may request an iGROW award to finance tuition and fees expenses not paid by MAP




- \$2 million was appropriated for Fiscal Year (FY) 2025
- The online application is currently available in the ISAC Student Portal
- The priority application consideration date is November 30, 2024
- A certification process will take place prior to awarding, and will be made available to institutions later this month.
- Scholarships will pay up to \$7,500 for tuition and fees, and room and board costs
- All applicants will be considered new applicants for this year, as this is the first year that program benefits will be provided to qualified, eligible students

Grant Programs for Dependents of Police, Fire, & Correctional Officers (PFC)

- Grant programs for the spouse and children of Illinois police, fire and correctional officers killed or at least 90% disabled in the line of duty
- For students enrolled at least half-time in undergraduate or graduate studies
- Provides payment toward tuition and mandatory fees for 8 semesters/
 12 quarters/4 years
- Must be factored into award package prior to MAP
 - Grant Program for Dependents of Correctional Officers [Part 2731]
 - Grant Program for Dependents of Police or Fire Officers [Part 2732]



Grant Programs for Dependents of Police, Fire, & Correctional Officers (PFC)

- To be eligible, a student:
 - Must be a U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen
 - Must be enrolled on at least a half-time basis at an institution that is approved for participation in MAP
 - Must be making satisfactory academic progress toward a degree or certificate;
 - Need not be a resident of Illinois at the time of enrollment; and
 - Does not have to demonstrate financial need to receive the grant.
- An applicant is ineligible if he or she is:
 - Either a spouse who remarries after an Illinois police, fire or correctional officer is killed in the line of duty, or is a spouse who divorces a permanently disabled Illinois police, fire or correctional officer; or
 - A stepchild who is not in the legal custody or legally adopted by the Illinois police, fire, or correctional officer.



PFC Application Process

- A PFC application must be submitted each year
- Deadline dates are:
 - October 1 for consideration for all terms
 - March 1 for consideration for second semester/second and third quarter
 - June 15 for consideration for summer term
- Payment request rosters are sent to schools each term after the application deadline has passed
- Announcements of eligibility are made to students as applications are received and processed

APPLICANT ELIGIBILITY:

- 1. A qualified applicant shall be:

 - the natural born or legally adopted child or a child in the legal custody of an Illinois police, fire or correctional officer who was killed or disabled in the line of duty (children of disabled police, fire and ctional officers need not have been born, legally adopted or in the legal custody of the officer before the disability occurred in order to receive these grants); or
 - ii. the husband or wife of the Illinois police, fire or correctional officer at the time the officer was killed in the line of duty or at the time a permanently disabling injury occurred in the line of duty; and
- b. a United States citizen or eligible noncitizen; and
- c. enrolled on at least a half-time basis at an institution that is approved for participation in the Monetary Award Program (MAP) (see isac.org).
- An applicant need not be a resident of Illinois at the time of enrollment.
- 3. An applicant does not have to demonstrate financial need to receive this grant.
- A spouse who remarries after an Illinois police, fire or correctional officer is killed in the line of duty, or who divorces a permanently disabled Illinois police, fire or correctional officer, is not eligible. Common law partners are not eligible.
- A step-child who is not in the legal custody or legally adopted by the Illinois police, fire or correctional officer is not eligible

BENEFITS:

- Grant payment is subject to sufficient annual appropriations by the Illinois General Assembly and the
- 2. In the event funds are insufficient to make awards to all timely qualified applicants, award amounts may be prorated.
- Recipients attending approved public colleges in Illinois shall receive full payment of tuition and mandatory fees on their behalf. The grant will cover the difference in cost for courses taken at an out-of-district college that are not offered at a recipient's in-district college. Recipients attending approved private colleges in Illinois shall receive payment of tuition and mandatory fees in an amount not to exceed the maximum grant payable to a student enrolled in the most expensive comparable program of study at a public college in Illinois. The grant may be used at any public or private college
- approved for participation in the Monetary Award Program (MAP). Benefits are limited to the full-time enrollment equivalent of eight semesters or twelve quarters of payment. See isac.org for a listing of approved colleges.
- 5. The applicant may receive benefits for undergraduate or

APPLICATION PROCEDURES:

- Complete applications received by ISAC after the deadline dates (see page 1) will be processed only for subsequent terms, with June 15, 2025 as the final date of acceptance for the summer term of the 2024-25 academic year.
- 2. The applicant must apply for the educational benefits and must supply all required documentation. In order to receive benefits, one application must be on file for each academic year, which begins with the fall term and concludes the following summer term. No payments will be made on behalf of an eligible student unless a current and complete application is on file.
 - a. Section I: Applicant's Information portion must be filed annually for each applicant.
 - b. Section II: Officer's Biographical Information needs to be completed only on the initial application. Once eligibility has been established for one member of a family, it is established for all qualified applicants in the family.

The applicant's initial application must be accompanied by the officer's certified death certificate or, for disabled officers, the certified statement of a licensed physician. The physician's statement, on their letterhead, must certify that the officer has a mental or physical condition that is reasonably certain to continue throughout the lifetime of the officer, resulting in a 90% to 100% incapacity from performing substantial and material duties previously discharged. Please note: If the doctor does not state the percentage of disability, the application is incomplete.

Separate documentation must be submitted to prove that the death or permanent disability of the officer occurred in the line of duty (usually from the officer's pension board or employer)

- c. Section III: Certification Statement must be completed
- If required by the college, the applicant should present a copy of the eligibility letter to the college's financial aid office at the time of enrollment. If the applicant is already enrolled when the eligibility letter is received, the letter should be presented to the college financial aid office immediately. Payments are made directly to the college at which the student is enrolled. The college also has deadlines for requesting payment on a student's behalf. Failure to present the eligibility letter and/or to notify ISAC of a college choice change, as required, may result in the loss of benefits.

PFC Student Notification

- ISAC sends all eligible grant recipients a notification letter, which may be provided to the school at the time of enrollment
 - If the student's college choice or address changes during the academic year, the student must notify ISAC in writing
- Ineligible applicants will also be sent written notification



PFC Benefits

- Benefits can be used for undergraduate or graduate study
- Pays tuition and mandatory fees
 - At a public institution, a student may receive a grant that does not exceed its cost of tuition and mandatory fees
 - At a private institution, a student may receive a grant that does not exceed the maximum amount payable to a student enrolled in the most expensive comparable program of study at a public institution



PFC Awarding

- The PFC grant must be factored into the financial aid package prior to receiving MAP gift assistance
 - The institution, however, may request a MAP grant to cover tuition and mandatory fee expenses not paid by PFC
- If a PFC recipient receives other assistance targeted specifically for tuition and fees, the combined assistance shall not exceed the total tuition and fee expenses incurred by the student
 - If it does, the institution shall reduce one of the awards accordingly
 - Any excess gift assistance is considered an over award, and the institution is required to notify ISAC to reduce the grant and/or other gift assistance to prevent an over award



PFC Payment Processing

- Certification of Enrollment for Payment Rosters are sent to schools each term after the application deadline has passed
- Colleges must return the roster even if a student isn't eligible
 - Must provide the reason for ineligibility
- Funds are disbursed in multiple installments, depending upon the number of terms financed by the grant
 - If the applicant's eligibility is not determined until the final term of the academic year multiple disbursements will not be required
 - If a student is attending only one term and the maximum award does not exceed the student's cost of attendance, the grant proceeds will be awarded in one single disbursement







Displaced Energy Worker Dependent Transition Scholarship Program

- Provides scholarship assistance to children (including adopted and stepchildren) of eligible displaced energy workers
 - Displaced Energy Worker is defined in ISAC's General Provisions as: an energy worker who has lost employment due to the reduced operation or closure of a fossil fuel power plant or coal mine
- Designed to support students who are deterred from attending or completing an educational program at an Illinois institution due to a parent's layoff from a retiring power plant or a closing coal mine
- Pays tuition and fee costs at public colleges or community colleges for the equivalent of an academic year, including summer, for undergraduate or graduate study
- Applicant does not need to be a resident of Illinois at the time of enrollment; however, the award is limited to the cost of in-district and in-state tuition and fees
- The 2025 fiscal year appropriation is \$1,100,000.



Displaced Energy Worker Dependent Transition Scholarship Program

- To qualify, an applicant must:
 - Be a U.S. citizen or an eligible non-citizen or meet the "undocumented student" criteria of the RISE Act
 - Be the natural child, legally adopted child or stepchild of an energy worker who has lost employment due to the reduced operation or closure of a fossil fuel power plant or coal mine
 - Be enrolled or accepted for enrollment, on a full- or part-time basis (at least 3 credit hours) at an Illinois public university or community college
 - In the absence of transition scholarship assistance, be deterred by financial considerations from completing an educational program at the Illinois public university or community college of choice
 - Be meeting satisfactory academic progress towards a degree or certificate, as determined by the college



DEWDT Application Process

- The application may be submitted online via the ISAC Student Portal
- An application must be submitted for each year that assistance is requested
 - o A FAFSA or Alternative Application must also be completed
- An application must be submitted by these deadline dates to be considered
 - October 1 full year consideration or first term only
 - March 1 second semester/third quarter only or second semester/third quarter and summer June 15 – summer term only
- First-time applicants must include biographical information about the displaced energy worker and upload proof of the worker's loss of employment due to the reduced operation or closure of a fossil fuel power plant or coal mine that occurred on or after September 15, 2016
 - Specific instructions are provided on the application
 - Once eligibility is established for one member of a family regarding the displaced worker, it is established for all qualified applicants in the family
- The online application has built-in edits to prevent errors, and a confirmation email will be sent to the applicant upon receipt by ISAC
 - If the application is incomplete or missing required documentation, the applicant will receive a letter from ISAC explaining the reason and how to resolve the issue



DEWDT Awarding & Payment Process

- Awards are made in multiple disbursements
 - For full-year awards,
 - semester schools may receive three disbursements (fall, spring, summer);
 - quarter schools may receive four disbursements (fall, winter, spring, summer).
- Multiple disbursements are not required in cases where the recipient's eligibility is not determined until the final term of the award year for which the scholarship is being awarded
- Schools may request a payment (claim) for any amount in the term(s), as long as it does not exceed the maximum awarded amount to the student and does not exceed the cost of attendance



DEWDT Payment Process

- A Certification of Enrollment for Payment Roster will be sent to your college to be completed as part of the payment request process
- Colleges will receive the Certification of Enrollment for Payment Roster each term following each term's application deadline date
- ISAC will then authorize a voucher in the amount of the payment claim and submits it to the State Comptroller's Office
- If a recipient withdraws from enrollment after the expiration of the tuition refund/withdrawal adjustment period, the recipient may receive the scholarship for costs incurred
