Each student should have an individualized learning plan to help make decisions about career and postsecondary (PS) education or training, to plan a course of study, and to make financial aid assessments with family members.

By the end of 9th grade

A student should be supported to:

- Understand that taking the right courses in high school can reduce the cost of college
- Prepare a budget
- Complete an orientation to career clusters
- Complete a career cluster survey
- Complete an elective course to explore career interests
- Attend a career exploration day
- Develop public speaking skills
- Compare and contrast personal strengths and weaknesses with career choices
- Complete a unit on education planning
- · Outline a plan for high school courses to prevent remediation at the college level
- Review coursework, and PS/career plans in relation to the ISBE College and Career Readiness Indicators (CCRIs)
- Meet with a school counselor to track progress and/or revise PS plans
- · Show evidence of PS plan

A student should know:

- The difference between need-based. merit-based, and self-help student financial aid programs
- · General cost ranges of various PS institutions
- · How salary impacts standard of living
- The concept of career clusters of interest
- · Career attributes related to career interests
- The relationship between coursework.
- attendance, and grades to PS plans • The benefit of early college credit
- opportunities to PS access and completion
- The different types of PS credential and institutions

By the end of 10th grade

A student should be supported to:

- Outline a plan to pay for college
- Understand pay stubs, W-2s, and income
- Understand different banking relations
- Be exposed to a financial literacy unit in a course or workshop
- Select a career pathway within a career cluster of interest
- Participate in a mock job interview
- Understand the job application process and terms
- Revisit career cluster interest survey and take a career interest survey
- Compare and contrast personal strengths and weaknesses with career choices
- Identify 2-3 adults to support the student through the PS and career selection process
- Understand the college placement process
- Attend a PS options workshop
- Review coursework, and PS/career plans in relation to the ISBE CCRIs
- Meet with a school counselor to track progress and/or revise PS plans
- Show evidence of PS plan

A student should know:

- Estimated cost of each PS option
- the affordability of PS options in relation to expected entry-level career salary and anticipated debt
- one or two career clusters for further exploration and development
- educational requirements, cost, expected entry level, and midpoint salary for occupations in selected career clusters
- the general timing of PS entrance exams and applications

By the end of 11th grade

A student should be supported to:

- Attend a PS affordability workshop with a family member
- Complete a financial aid assessment with a family member
- Interview a professional who is working in desired field
- Visit at least one workplace aligned with career interests
- Participate in a job shadowing opportunity
- Create a resume
- Identify an internship opportunity related to career pathways
- Revisit career cluster interest survey and take a career interest survey
- Compare and contrast personal strengths and weaknesses with career choices
- Take at least one college entrance exam
- Identify two related PS paths and/or college majors strongly correlated with assessment results
- Review coursework, and PS/career plans in relation to the ISBE CCRIs
- Meet with a school counselor to track progress and/or revise PS plans
- Show evidence of PS plan

A student should know:

- The terms and conditions of any scholarship or loan
- Where to find scholarship opportunities
- How career pathways courses and experiences articulate to degree programs at postsecondary options
- · Entrance requirements, including application deadlines, for expected PS programs of study
- 3-5 match school, one safety, one reach school for PS program of study
- Visit at least 3 PS institutions
- Revisit a plan for high school courses to prevent remediation at the college level

By the end of 12th grade

A student should be supported to:

- Learn about debt and credit scores
- Learn about savings and investments
- Create a personal statement
- Revisit career cluster interest survey and take a career interest survey
- Compare and contrast personal strengths and weaknesses with career choices
- · Review coursework, and PS/career plans in relation to the ISBE CCRIs
- Meet with a school counselor to track progress and/or revise PS plans
- Show evidence of PS plan

A student should know:

• financial aid deadlines for chosen PS options

By 12/31, a student should have:

- Attended a FAFSA completion workshop
- Completed the FAFSA
- Meet with a school counselor to ensure all steps in the PS admissions process are completed on time
- · Complete 3 or more admissions applications to PS institutions
