Postsecondary and Career Expectations

Each student should have an individualized learning plan to help make decisions about career and post-secondary (PS) education or training, to plan a course of study, and to make financial aid assessments with family members.



By the end of 8th grade

A student should be supported to:

- Develop public speaking skills
- Utilize technology to network outside own community
- Learn to protect themselves against identity theft
- Understand that taking the right courses in high school can reduce the cost of college
- Review coursework, and PS/career plans in relation to the ISBE College and Career Readiness Indicators (CCRIs)
- Connect with a mentor.
- Meet with a counselor to discuss coursework and PS/career plans using ISBE CCRIs
- Meet with a school counselor to track progress and/or revise PS plans

A student should know:

- Own learning style and how it relates
 Where to find scholarship to career interests
- The relationship between high school coursework, attendance, and grades to PS plans
- The relationship between community service/extracurricular activities and PS/career goals

By the end of 9th grade

A student should be supported to:

- Be exposed to a financial literacy unity in a course workshop
- Learn about savings and investments
- Understand different banking relations
- Review coursework, and PS/career plans in relation to the ISBE CCRIs
- · Connect with a mentor
- Meet with a counselor to discuss coursework and PS/career plans using ISBE CCRIs
- Meet with a school counselor to track progress and/or revise PS plans

A student should know:

- Career attributes related to career interests
- One or two career clusters for further exploration and development
- How salary impacts standard of living
- opportunities
- Negative impact of remediation on PS goals

By the end of 10th grade

A student should be supported to:

- Participate in mock job interview
- Create a resume and personal statement
- Understand the job application process and
- Select a career pathway within a career cluster of interest
- Attend a workshop on employer expectations and employability skills
- Compare and contrast personal strengths and weaknesses with career choice
- Complete a career cluster survey
- Prepare a budget
- Outline a plan to pay for college
- Explore internships and apprenticeships for scholarships and money opportunities
- · Attend a college fair
- Review coursework, and PS/career plans in relation to the ISBE CCRIs
- Connect with a mentor
- Meet with a counselor to discuss coursework and PS/career plans using ISBE
- Meet with a school counselor to track progress and/or revise PS plans

A student should know:

- Educational requirements, cost, expected entry level, and midpoint salary for occupations in selected career clusters
- The affordability of PS options in relation to expected entry-level career salary and anticipated debt
- The different types of PS credentials and institutions
- · The benefit of early college credit opportunities to PS access and completion

By the end of 11th grade

A student should be supported to:

- Complete a unit on employee benefits and retirement planning
- Interview a professional who is working in desired field
- Attend a career exploration day
- Understand pay stubs, W-2s, and income taxes
- Address any remedial needs in math/ELA
- Identify 2-3 adults to support the student through the PS and career selection process
- Understand the college placement process
- Take at least one college entrance exam
- Review coursework, and PS/career plans in relation to the ISBE CCRIs
- · Connect with a mentor
- · Meet with a counselor to discuss coursework and PS/career plans using ISBE • Meet with a counselor to discuss **CCRIs**
- · Meet with a school counselor to track progress and/or revise PS plans

A student should know:

- · About internship opportunities related to the career pathways
- General cost ranges of various PS institutions
- The difference between need-based. merit-based, and self-help student financial aid programs
- How salary impacts standard of living
- · General timing of PS entrance exams and applications
- Entrance requirements, including application deadlines, for expected postsecondary programs of study

By the end of 12th grade

A student should be supported to:

- Participating in a job shadowing opportunity
- Visit at least one workplace aligned with career interests
- Be aware of job outlook by geographic area
- Complete a thorough scholarship search and application process
- Visit at least 3 PS institutions
- Secure letters of recommendation for college and scholarship applications
- Identify two related PS paths and/or college majors strongly correlated with assessment results
- Complete a college fit/match inventory
- Review coursework, and PS/career plans in relation to the ISBE CCRIs
- Connect with a mentor
- coursework and PS/career plans using ISBE **CCRIs**
- Meet with a school counselor to track progress and/or revise PS plans

A student should know:

- Estimated cost of each PS option
- The terms and conditions of any scholarship or loan
- Where to find scholarship opportunities

By 12/31, a student should have:

- Complete 3 or more admissions applications to PS institutions
- · Meet with a school counselor to ensure all steps in the PS admissions process are completed on time
- Complete the FAFSA
- Attend a FAFSA completion workshop
